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Course Description

Theological and pastoral principles for presiding within the liturgical assembly. A practicum for presiding at sacramental liturgies and other rites.

Course Objectives

This course is intended to enable the student to understand and articulate the principle liturgical actions of the Roman Catholic Church, their guiding prescriptions as found in the liturgical books used in Canada, and the liturgical style necessary to accomplish them.

M.DIV. Program Students

- a) **Intellectual Formation** – The rituals of the Roman Catholic Church are expressions of the faith revealed by Jesus Christ. These rituals express the lived faith of the Church. This course delves into the theology of the rituals and outlined in the ritual books themselves in order to better understand the richness of the ceremonies.

- b) **Cultural Context** – By comparing and contrasting the reforms of the missal, a greater understanding will be explored of the Biblical influence being expressed within today's cultural context.
- c) **Personal and Spiritual Formation** – Christian ritual is the Church's expression of Her life through, with, and in Christ. These rituals must be presided in faith. Through reflection and understanding of the rituals, deeper faith should be fostered.
- d) **Capacity for Ministerial Leadership** – A major role of a Christian leader is to help guide the faithful to the Lord so that they may grow in their love of Him and offer that love to all they meet. Christian ritual is always an expression of the Father's love offered through His Son, Jesus Christ, by the working of the Holy Spirit. Faithfully presiding at Christian rituals enlivens the Christian community. In order to accomplish this, understanding the rituals in themselves and how they relate to each other to manifest the presence of Christ is essential.

Course Assignments and Evaluation

1. MEETINGS/CLASSES. As this class is a practicum, it will be necessary to meet on a weekly basis to discuss the readings and prepare the students to preside at their liturgies. Students will have assigned readings and questions and must come prepared for the classes. The students and professor will put together a class schedule at the beginning of the semester.
2. TEST indicating knowledge of the "General Norms for the Liturgical Year and the Calendar", "Introduction to the Lectionary", "General Instruction of the Roman Missal"; The Roman Missal as a Liturgical Book (Sacramentary and Lectionary). (25%) **DATE: October 26, 2021.**
3. TEST indicating knowledge of the General Introductions and Contents of the Rites of Christian Initiation, Holy Week, Penance, Marriage, Pastoral Care of the Sick, Book of Blessings, Order of Christian Funerals, Holy Communion and Worship of the Eucharist outside Mass, General Instruction to the Liturgy of the Hours and Instruction "Ad resurgendum cum Christo." (25%) **DATE: December 14, 2021.**
4. Prepare a video of one assigned rite. (25%) **DATE: Due throughout the course, as assigned.**
5. Prepare a video of yourself presiding and preaching at the Holy Eucharist. (25%) [Lay students will prepare another appropriate rite as agreed with the instructor.] **DATE: November 23, 2021**

Course Requirements

This course is a combination of lecture, discussion and practicum. Class lectures will primarily familiarize the students with general principles, pertinent literature and resources. Discussions will review the assigned readings. The students will prepare and preside at a Eucharistic Celebration (digitally-recorded), and prepare as well as execute a major liturgical rite (digitally-recorded) with evaluation by the instructor and by their peers.

There are no academic papers for this course. The learning goals will be assessed through the practica which will be evaluated by the teacher and students as well as the discussions and tests on the contents of the ritual books which will show the students' knowledge of the rubrics, and contents of the various rites.

Providing a means by which student learning, in view of the course objectives can be measured. Possible items such as attendance, reading, class participation, term papers (papers, presentations, book reports, group work, and projects), and exams.
